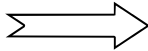

Meal delivery to homebound: Homebound people of any age can have a meal delivered Mon-Fri at the cost of \$4.50 per day. People over 60 or disabled may receive financial assistance (when funds are available) if they go through an Intake & Assessment by Aging and Community Services. (For married couples, only one spouse must be 60 or over.)

Senior Farmer's Market Voucher Program: People age 60 or over may receive vouchers to buy fresh produce from state-approved local farmer's markets. Apply for vouchers from May through October at Aging & Community Services.

Intake and eligibility vary by program. Services offered: Energy Assistance Programs; Weatherization Programs; Self-Sufficiency case management; Section 8 housing vouchers; Wheels to Work; Brown County Medical Van.

- **Energy Assistance Programs (EAP)** - Assistance with utility payments for summer cooling, winter heating; also Summer Fill program to assist those using bulk fuel. Intake: Call for appointment, bring Social Security card, ID, proof of income, and other documents as requested.
- **Medical Van** -- Provides transportation services for medical appointments only to all residents of Brown County. No fees, open to all, no restrictions. Call 3 days in advance to schedule.
- **Wheels to Work, Section 8 housing vouchers, Self-Sufficiency case management** - call for information.

If your household is between 151% - 200% of the Federal poverty level (between \$30,000—\$40,000 for a family of four) and have received a disconnect notice, you may qualify for up to \$200 in utility assistance.

Your Township Trustees . . .

Township Trustees can provide temporary assistance to people in need, usually in the form of payment for groceries, fuel, rent, services, medical treatment, work training, etc., but not cash. Applicants must provide proof of residence and proof of financial need

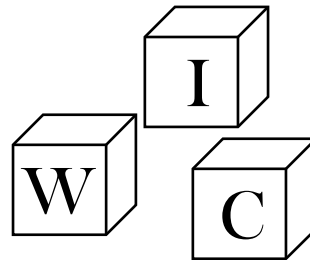

- **Food Stamps** — Provides food stamps for low income households . Applicants must meet income and resource guidelines.
- **Medicaid Program** — Health care for low income children and families, senior citizens and people with severe disabilities. Must meet income and resource guidelines and in some cases disability criteria.
- **TANF Program** — Provides cash assistance and support services to help low-income families. Must comply with child support enforcement.
- **Hoosier Healthwise** — Health insurance for children, pregnant women and low-income families; children up to age 19 can receive 'premium-free' or low-cost coverage. Call for details.

Services include Indiana Partnership for Inclusive Child Care (IPICC), Better Baby Care Indiana, Mentors as Partners (MAP), Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) Voucher Program Certification, Resource Lending Library and Project Brain Tree.

Helps pay cost of child care for low-income working parents or those in full-time educational or training programs. Parent selects the provider.

Child care can be in the home or a day care facility, or can be provided by a relative or friend who is a legally licensed exempt provider. Providers must meet minimum standards for health and safety. Payment is made directly to the provider at an established market rate. The parent must pay the difference between the provider's charges and market rate.

Home & Community-Based Services --

Coordinates services for people age 60+, disabled, or HIV-positive to enable them to live independently at home as long as possible. Homemaker/handyman services, Home Health aides, money management, representative payee, volunteer matching. Call for intake and assessment.

Caring Connections - Volunteers visit and help elderly, disabled, or HIV positive people. Volunteers can help with errands, grocery shopping, transportation, minor home repairs, snow or leaf removal, other services. Clients must cover the cost of materials.

Caregivers List - A list of caregivers that elderly and disabled people can hire to provide in-home care. Fees vary. Call for details.

Household Services - Support services to elderly or disabled persons for simple home repairs and maintenance. Call to schedule eligibility assessment.

Senior Smile Program - Dental care free (or reduced rate) for people 65+ who do not have Medicaid or insurance. Call for intake forms.

Lifeline Emergency Call System - An emergency-response system works through the telephone system to send emergency personnel to someone's home when the person activates the Lifeline device. Can be purchased through Aging & Community Services.

Gatekeeper Program - Trained utility workers or service providers watch for signs of possible problems with disabled or 60+ customers. Must be enrolled in Aging & Community Services.

Older Worker Employment Program - Provides skills training and employment for Older Americans. Contact Experience Works 800-843-0885.

When it's time for a Nursing Home . . .

Preadmission Screening - A medical and social-service team will assess Seniors to help with nursing home placement.

Guardianship Program - Guardianship and advocacy for vulnerable people and nursing home residents who lack community support; education and general information regarding guardianship services.

Long Term Care Ombudsman - Legal help and assistance with complaints from nursing home residents and their families. Can also provide information about estate planning, power of attorney, advance directives, living wills, and Medicaid eligibility.

Senior Health Insurance Information Program (SHIIP) - The Indiana Department of Insurance trains volunteers to help Seniors who receive Federal benefits with insurance questions and problems.

Money Management Program - Representative Payee & Bill Payer volunteers help people manage their finances.

Foster Grandparent Program - Seniors (age 60+) who meet income guidelines serve 20 hours a week as friends to children in local schools and receive a stipend of \$2.65/hour (this does not affect other benefits).

Senior Games - People 50+ can compete in a variety of physical and creative activities every September.

'TRIAD' stand for 'The Right Information And Direction'. Volunteers provide helpful services for Seniors, disabled people, those recovering from surgery or anyone on their own who would like to be checked in on from time to time. They check on the well being of all who wish to be checked on. TRIAD has contacts to supply hospital beds, walkers, wheelchairs or canes to those who have no means to obtain them. They provide home visits, nursing home visits, hospital visits, funeral calls, wood cutting, Thanksgiving meal delivery, and food drives. TRIAD will install and check smoke detectors, warn of scams, perform CPR, offer advocacy with government agencies, deliver food from St. Vincent de Paul, and send Birthday and Christmas cards to all.

Serves victims of domestic violence and their children, and victims of rape/sexual assault. Services include safe shelter; case management; advocacy; peer counseling; crisis intervention; support groups; and children's programs. Individuals can stay at the shelter for up to 30 days, longer in exceptional cases. Turning Point will arrange for transportation for victims to the shelter in emergencies. Will accept donated cell phones.

You don't have to give your name. You can call for advice or emotional support, or to talk about making a safety plan. You can call for safe shelter.

You and your children can stay at the shelter for up to 30 days, longer in some cases. Turning Point will arrange for transportation to the shelter in emergencies.

Provides basic information about filing for divorce, modifying custody, requesting child support, safety planning, pursuing criminal charges, and finding counseling services. Offers court advocacy, which assists victims in understanding court protocol and will accompany a client to court to promote safety during a court hearing.
